WARBIRDS ON PARADE AT ARDMORE Vince Middeldorp

The nine of us who went to see the New Zealand Warbirds display on 6 December were treated to the sight of ex- military and classic aircraft flying past at close range; some performing aerobatics and others involved in precision formation flying. Ian Smith's idea of going no further than the Ardmore Café worked out perfectly. The Café was not overcrowded and we were able to sit out on the deck and watch the entire display.

The first aircraft that flew past were the oldest. Given the dangerous nature of flying back in the days when they were built, I was surprised that anyone would now want to take the risk of flying in one.

During the day I ended up talking with a former top-dressing pilot who was knowledgeable about the various aircraft on display. He told me the best Rolls Royce Merlin engines were built in the USA by the Packard Motor Company. I checked out his story and found that Rolls-Royce produced 82,117 (at Derby, Crewe and Glasgow); Packard USA 55,523; Ford of Britain 30,428.

Even though we combined with Waitakere Rebus, we only managed to get enough people interested in going to pay for a mini-bus. Having said that, the mini-bus was very comfortable and had we had turned up with a full busload the facilities at the café would not have coped.

My recommendation to those who didn't go and may now regret having missed it, is to keep an eye on the Warbirds Association website (https://nzwarbirds.org.nz/). They run a few of display days every year and Ardmore Airport is not as far away as you might think.

It does not appear to represent any Probus, Rebus or Friendship clubs.
