

Bill Mutch welcomed 16 members to the meeting and blamed the low turnout on the weather.

Apologies were recorded for Neil Castle, Mensto De Roos, John Corban and Ray Barrett. There were no visitors.

The minutes of the previous meeting were signed by Bill Mutch. There were no matters arising from the previous meeting.

Correspondence items were an email from Kay Thomas chair of the local Whau Board and a Rebus Chronicles asking us to think seriously about carrying on with all the Covid-19 around. Treasurer Charles Nicholls suggested we poll all members one week before the next meeting to see if they want it called off.

Charles Nichols reported that we currently have a net surplus of \$290.07 over the year's income. The bank balance in the current account was \$729.62; the money in the cash box \$113.60; the money on term deposit \$1220.78.

Ian Smith described the lunch at Cheltenham as a big success but more so for Waitakere Rebus than West Auckland Rebus. He said Gold Card trips resulted in only a few members going along.

Bill Mutch asked if there was any general business. Vince Middedorp showed what he was doing to get new members on the Facebook and Neighbourly websites, Community Hall and Library notice boards and in the Western Leader. His idea is to advertise the meetings and not the club.

Noel Rose said the speaker for net month would be Raymond Barrett's brother Senior Sergeant Bob Barrett.

Bill Mutch said the next meeting would be second Friday of the month 12 August.

Trevor Pollard provided tea, coffee and biscuits for the morning tea break.


Guest speaker Phil Sai-Louie divided the members into four groups and conducted a 20 question quiz competition.

POLL RESULTSVince Middeldorp



The results of the poll are shown below.



The number of members who took part in the poll was disappointingly low. However those who took part voted overwhelmingly for the meeting to go ahead.

You can't read too much into three members saying they will not attend. Because of their circumstances two of these members never attend our meetings. It is good to see them still taking a keen interest in the club via our email correspondence and monthly newsletters.

When the Sendinblue dashboard is looked at it can be seen that the low response rate was not because members did not read the email. Twenty-two members opened the email and only eleven clicked on the link to take part in the poll.

The reason there are twelve responses and only eleven members shown as having clicked the link to take part in the poll, is that one member was asked in person what he wanted to vote for and his response was entered manually.

For those that are interested in this dashboard, there are two mailing lists, one with 31 names and the other 39 names. The one used for the newsletter has more names because it includes former members of the club.

Openers are people who we can assume are reading the emails we send to them. The way it works is that there are images (e.g. photos) in the covering emails sent out with the newsletters or in this case with the link to the poll webpage. These images are not part of the email. They are instantaneously downloaded into the email from a server when the email is opened. The server records who the image was supplied to. Clicking on the blue Report button generates a list of names showing who has, and who has not, read the email. In this case we only went so far as to look at the tally of those who read the email.

JULY MEETING

Phil Sai-Louie's estimate is that he has given around 300 talks to Probus, Rebus, Friendship and historical societies.

That explains how, when July's scheduled speaker needed to be replaced, Phil Sai-Louie was able to step into the speaker's slot at virtually a moment's notice.

As mentioned earlier in the meeting report, fears of catching Omicron and a wet winter's day resulted in only sixteen members attending the meeting. Remarkably Phil knew two of them. Trevor Pollard was on a seven day historical society trip to the Wairarapa which Phil went on many years ago. Charles Nicholls was in the same cricket team as Phil at Auckland Boy's Grammar.

The expectation was that Phil would give one of his regular talks, such as surnames of the British Isles. However he chose not to do that and instead organised a quiz.

Everyone in the room was put into one of four groups and the groups competed against each other. All the quiz questions were multi-choice. The group with the most correct answers was promised a "fantastic prize."

After asking a question, Phil asked each group which answer they had selected. He periodically gave out the current score. The group leading early in the contest did not hold on to win. After the first five questions all the groups were equal on two points.

It was possible to game the system a little because each group would be asked in turn for an answer. The last group to answer had the benefit knowing what answer the other groups had chosen and making a last minute change. To mitigate against this unfairness, Phil alternated the order in which the groups were called on for their answers.

My expectation, based on what I observed in the quizzes conducted by Tom Miller, was that the team with John Mihaljevic in it was a shoe-in to win. John knows the answer to things that no one else would ever know. However that did not happen.

The group that won consisted of Ian Smith, Peter Cox, Andrew Narayan and myself. There was a question involving Lotus cars which Ian Smith nailed and two UK pop music questions which Peter Cox was sure about, having lived in England during the pop music era.

The quiz was lively and a lot of fun. There was even some mayhem when Phil made the final question worth six points, so that the team running last could get up to win. To everyone's surprise not one team got the last question correct. That meant the team in the lead with one question to go, and who had protested loudest about awarding six points for the last question, ended up winning.



To all students travelling on the Western line, I say, "you are a great group of young adults".


